



# Welcome speech Dr Paul Jose P

Good morning to all. "When the going gets tough, the tough get going". This was the advice given by Joseph Kennedy, the father of John F Kennedy. Good morning to Kerala. Thank you, Principal Dr. Paul Jose for inviting me to give a welcome address to the Second International Conference on Social Sciences (ICSS -II)that takes place today at Tharananellur. Dear participants, dear researchers, dear representatives of universities, and students who I heard joining as well, those who know me know that I have been an entrepreneur for 25 years of my life. And, I started a business, was a fourth generation successor in a family business and co-founded a high-tech, high start, high-growth business. And, when on day three, after I joined Bangkok University, a research project

was actually dumped on my table, I felt like having a new startup. and that is why I want to address to you that research is like creating a start up. and, the downside is nine out of ten startups fail. And so, you as a researcher, nine out of 10 might not make it into that high-ranked journal, might not get the publication in that prestigious journal because you will be rejected.

Now, there are five characteristics of startups that make them successful. I think they also apply to your research and the work you do on your research. Number one, the product has to be perfect for the market. The same applies to you. Your product needs to fill a market need; needs to fill a gap. It needs to be perfect for the market it addresses. So, if you are going to spend time making a product, then also spend time making sure it is the right product for the right market. Number two, the product has a unique selling point, a USP. Your research; what is the research question? Which gap does it fill? Is there something that lets us say, wow, when we read your paper, something unique, something we haven't heard?

Number three, an entrepreneur will not ignore anything. They have a great idea, a great product. They have a strong team. So do you. What do they lack? Everything is organic; also in research. Roles and responsibilities will overlap. Small things can turn into large things. There are issues with the research process, the research model, and what to do with the research findings. So you have to work on your research, not in your research.

Number four, startups grow fast. Research grows fast. The body of research, of literature, grows fast. If you do not, as a researcher yourself, do not grow fast enough, you will most likely fall behind. Growth leads to more growth, which leads to even more growth. If you do not grow yourself and your body of knowledge, you'll be shrinking.

Number five, a startup team knows how to recover. Because you need the ability also in research to change the product, to adjust the product to a different plan, to take up a new approach, to shift your focus, and maybe even to tear down your whole research and start all over again.

And, it is about recovering from those blows when you get rejected, maybe even rejected from a great conference, which can happen. So teams that are able or researchers that can recover, you have to get through. Having a co-founder might help, and having a co-author might help here as well. So, in conclusion, if your startup and your research as a startup, plus you are lucky, because you have been able to do something that 90% of others have not, you may be successful. Even though there's always a lot of luck involved in success stories, these five reasons are more humble reasons why others might be successful. A product that meets a need, a unique selling point, not ignoring anything, growing your knowledge fast, and recovering from a blowback will be successful. If you have got these five characteristics, then, I think you are setting yourself up for major success. And this is what I wish all of you. I wish all of you big success today and tomorrow in your presentations and in your researcher life and take it as a startup and go for it. Thank you very much and all the best.




